• From the desk of the pastor

From glory to glory, my God is changing me. I am full of joy. On Sept. 12, 2022, I left the Virgin Islands' shores heading to Fort Jackson, South Carolina, for training to become a chaplain. The struggle to get there was real. I was leaving my Parish for three months. This was the longest I had ever been away from my parish. I did not know what to expect. I heard many stories. The unknown was a little frightening.

I think this is one of the hardest things I might have done in my life. We did physical training every morning. For the first month, we could not leave the base. We marched to classes and for our meals. We ate in silence and followed the rules. At times I asked myself, "am I going to make it?" Every morning, I woke up and I went on my knees asking God for the grace to complete the day. That was my prayer every day. All my life, God has been faithful. I knew he was not going to give up on me now. I got into my room and laid out all my friends – St. Michael, St. Joseph, St. Therese, and Mary, our mother.

Our day began at about four in the morning and classes ended at five in the afternoon. The academics were very heavy. Many of us used coffee or vitamins to keep our eyes open. We had more than 80 men and women training to become Chaplains.

It was just an excellent group of people. There were many people with prior service, and they were extremely willing to help others like me with no prior service. We were our brothers and sisters' keepers. We shared our love and looked out for each other.

We prayed and attended other churches, which was very interesting. I attended my first Jewish, Muslim, and Mormon services. I concelebrated on weekends at the Catholic Masses and listened to confessions. It was amazing to see the number of young men and women who attended the weekend Masses. The Catholic attendance was the largest.

In my last month of training, I injured my back. I was on painkillers, and the pain at times seemed unbearable. I was prayed with by some of the brothers and thanks be to God, I was able to finish my training. The pain eventually subsided.

What a mighty God we serve. I am so grateful to the many people who sent cards, mail, texted or called. I graduated as a Chaplain with the rank as a Captain and is assigned to a unit in San Juan, Puerto Rico. I am so grateful to God for giving me this opportunity to serve the men and women in the U.S. Army. I thank my Bishop for seeing the need for priests to serve in the Army. I thank Fr. Serapio for celebrating the Sacraments with my parish in my absence. I thank my staff and parishioners. Thank you! Thank you!

St. Therese Chapel permit approval



Running with God

ast year July, I woke up one day and thought,
"I can run a half marathon." That thought had

so much conviction and power behind it that I knew that I could do it. Up to that point, I

had never run more than 10 kilometers/

6.2 miles before. Even as a St. Johnian, I never participated in the annual 8 Tuff Miles Road Race. I just never had a desire to. However, that one morning in July I just knew I could do it. I could run those 21 kilometers / 13.1 miles to complete a half marathon.

I started researching half marathon training plans, tips for running long distances, ways to fuel the body while running, runner's diets, running attire, best

running watches, etc. For months my search history and bookmarks were all about completing a half marathon. I joined a local running group and I also sent my sister my race registration information as a way to validate my goal.

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Looking back at it now, I'm amazed I did it. However, the prep work was not always sunshine and unicorns and Hebrews 12:11 captures my sentiments clearly.

On October 2, 2022, I was able to enjoy the fruits of my labor and completed my first half marathon in 2 hours, 29 minutes and 35 seconds.

I know that I could not achieve my goal without four key factors.

1. Prayer

I started each run with a prayer. Each time my watch

• • • beeped indicating I completed a kilometer, I

thanked God. I thanked Him for what I had
just accomplished and thanked Him in
advance for each kilometer still yet to
come. I also thanked Him as I iced

my knees after my runs.

2. Faith

My faith was compulsory. I had to have faith that God would see me through this (Matthew 9:28-29; Matthew 19:26) and I had to have faith in my training plan.

3. Diligence

I had to engage that power of diligence in order to accomplish my goal because it was tempting to find an excuse not to train and

to hit the snooze button on the alarm clock.

4. Positive Declarations

We all know of the power in our tongues and I used different positive declarations while training and running to stay motivated.

My running experience was reminiscent of Luke 24:13 where the two disciples were walking seven miles to Emmaus and encountered Jesus. At times I was conversing with the God who listens, at times I was the one trying to listen, and at other times I was just trying to focus on my breathing.

When I crossed the finish line I was overwhelmed at what I had just done and the work I put in for months. I was excited and already thinking about signing up for another half marathon and excited to continue running with God.


