
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Parish Announcements

'Spiritual Eyes: Holy-Spirit Guided Unity of Short-term and Long-term Vision'

This Sunday's Mass readings can be used to illustrate that when believers use their spiritual eyes, they see neither multi-dimensional nor color-based but distance-oriented, that is, via short-term and long-term vision, which is guided by the Holy Spirit, who often operates subtly and undetected in the lives of believers.

In the First Reading (Baruch 5:1-9), the prophet Baruch, who once performed scribal duties for the prophet Jeremiah, gives hope to the Jews living as refugees in Egypt by portraying the end of the Exile. In this reading, Baruch's writing poetically offers consolation to Jerusalem by giving hope of the end of captivity. Baruch's short-term vision allows him to see the circumstances of the Jews suffering as refugees in Egypt, and he uses this to re-create the setting of Babylon where the majority of Jews are in exile, thereby giving him the opportunity to offer hope to the Jews in exile in Egypt. Baruch's long-term vision is a better tomorrow for Jerusalem when all her children will be returned to her, "But God will bring them back to you." Baruch's vision of a better tomorrow for Jerusalem is also applicable to people of all times.

Christians are being called to have faith and hope that Jesus is our promise of a better tomorrow. As believers, we too are invited to have a short-term and long-term vision. We have to recognize our present circumstances as God's will and plan for us individually and communally. In Advent, we ponder our current lived circumstances. However, we are also called to acknowledge that a realistic long-term vision is the promise of Jesus' Second Coming. Jesus comes also into our lives daily making the mountains low and the gorges level, signifying brining order to what seems chaotic. The Holy Spirit, the love that binds the Trinity, is the active force that guides our lives. When we face circumstances beyond our human power, the Spirit takes over, whether we realize it or not, empowering and guiding us as the Spirit empowered and guided Baruch to offer consolation to those around him.

The Gospel Reading (Luke 3:1-6) portrays John the Baptist as a prophet like Baruch in the Old Testament who received a prophetic call and who makes a pronouncement to the people of his time. However, John is more than a prophet, in that, he is, more importantly, a precursor to Jesus, which Luke himself mentions (7:27). John's words echo that of Baruch's but with a difference. Baruch describes the power of God that makes the mountains low and the gorges levelled. John suggests that as part of his listeners' preparation for the Coming of the Lord, they must put their lives in order, making every mountain and hill low, straightening winding roads, and smoothening rough ways. All of these descriptions propose John's short-term view of his listeners changing their way of living by turning away from sin. Only when this is done, will the salvation of God for all be realized — John's long-term view, which is inspired by the Holy Spirit who has revealed these things to him. The Holy Spirit empowered John, inspired him, and spoke through John. In the Second Reading (Philippians 1:4-6, 8-11), Paul writes while being held as a prisoner, just as Baruch writes similarly like a prisoner in Egypt, a foreign land. Paul writes to Philippi, which is the first Christian community he established in Europe. As part of his short-term vision, Paul provides encouragement to the Philippians because of the gratitude he has for them in supporting him in the spreading of the Gospel. Then, Paul expresses part of his long-term vision: "I am confident of this, that the one who began a good work in you will continue to complete it until the day of Christ Jesus." Such bold faith in the unknown is only possible through the power of the Holy Spirit that empowers a believer. Here Paul is referencing Jesus' Second Coming. During Advent, Catholics are also invited to ponder Jesus' coming at Christmas as a short-term view but also Jesus' Second Coming or Parousia as a long-term view.

Paul then offers a prayer for his brothers and sisters in Philippi whom he "longs" for "with the affection of Jesus Christ." This prayer reflects John the Baptist's preaching on preparing the way of the Lord: "That your love may increase ever more and more in knowledge and every kind of perception, to discern what is of value." Part of preparing the way of the Lord is discerning what is of value. Discernment is a gift of the Holy Spirit. Preparing also necessitates being filled with the fruit of righteousness. Spiritual fruits derive from the Holy Spirit. Many Christians are not aware of the gifts and fruits of the Spirit that they possess, yet they benefit from, use, and manifest them unknowingly. This prayer extends as an invitation to all Christians. We must strive to keep our eyes on the prize — salvation — by keeping our eyes fixed on Jesus and walking a straight path with Jesus, relying on the guidance of the Holy Spirit who is working quietly but powerful

Prayer: Thank you, Lord, that by my prayer and sacrifice this Advent season, my spiritual eyes will be opened. Amen



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
